November Meeting:

Welcome to new member and grower *Tim Culbertson*

"What is a Maudiae Paph. and why you should grow them."

" I will discuss historical Maudiaes and the incorporation of newly discovered species in Maudiae-type breeding, and will conclude with a quiz of sorts to help growers identify the most important traits passed on to Maudiae-type paphs from different species in the mix.

My name is Tim Culbertson, and I've been growing orchids since 1998. My collection has always been focused on Paphs., particularly species and hybrids of historical importance, and including many awarded complex hybrids from the early to mid-1900s. I also do some hybridization of my own. I grow my 1500 plants, including orchids, bromeliads, begonias, and aroids in a 40'x10' greenhouse I recently built at my home in East Falmouth, after growing in a number of rented spaces and under lights in California. I am an accredited AOS judge in the Northeast region."

Of Historical Interest: From 1875 comes this—"The Orchid Hunter in Burmah No. 1

"So much has been written, and well written, about Orchids that it seems difficult to break fresh ground and note anything new about them, useful and instructive to the horticulturalist, to the Lover of Orchids. And to all interested in this charming tribe of plants.

The observations of the Orchid-Hunter made at their places of growth may, however, prove to be of considerable use both to the professional cultivator and the amateur.....

....The special home of *Dendrobium formosum* on the hills to the south of the road running from Moulmein to Amherst(Burma)....

All these varieties of *formosum* grow on the branches of trees in the west exposed situations, subject to the influences of a blazing sun in the summer and to a continual downpour of rain during the rainy season; the rainfall in this part of Burmah averaging 200 inches, during the season,

Were it not for the dews at night during the summer months the plants would undoubtedly die. Thousands of the small seedlings, and some of the larger plants, as it is, die every season. This shows that,

although this, like other Orchids, requires a season of rest, it is necessary for the cultivator to imitate the nightly dews during the resting season, which is best done by giving a very slight watering at the roots in the early morning; by this means the horticulturalist can not only insure the plant keeping in a robust and healthy condition, but he can improve on the circumstances of nature by supplying during the scorching months that shelter which the plant does not have in its jungles. During the season of growth it is unnecessary to say that plenty of water is essential.- E. S. B." The Journal of horticulture, cottage gardener and country gentlemen, London, 1875, p 248-9
