Fred Clarke of Sunset Valley Orchids will present "Today's Mini and Compact Cattleyas"

Fred Clarke has been growing and hybridizing orchids for over 25 years, applying his skills at his orchid nursery, Sunset Valley Orchids. His pioneering work in Catasetum intergeneric hybrids lead to the development of several notable hybrids, most recently the grex, Fredclarkeara After Dark., which produced "the blackest flower ever witnessed". This grex received eight FCC's, four AM's and the coveted "Award of Distinction" on the first flowers shown for judging. *Today's Mini and Compact Cattleyas* will be a detailed look at species and latest developments in the breeding and growing of these colorful flowers. Cattleyas - Basic Care and Information

Water: Cattleyas store water in both their psuedobulbs and their roots. Miniature cattleyas and seedlings need more frequent watering than the larger standard cattleyas because they store less water. Potted in a bark mix (finer bark for the smaller cattleyas and seedlings) the mix should be allowed to dry out before re-watering. Summer months and active growth periods will require more frequent watering.. If in doubt, wait a day. Generally, watering once a week to ten days is sufficient for large cattleyas; seedlings and miniatures need water every five to seven days. When watering, place the plant in the sink and use tepid water. Do not use salt-softened or distilled water. Let the water run through the plant for a minute or so. Be sure to let the plant drain completely.

Light: Cattleyas belong to the 'high' light group of orchids. The bright light of an east or west window is ideal; south windows can also be used if shaded with a sheer curtain. The leaves should be medium green. If your plant is not blooming for you try increasing the light. Without sufficient light a cattleya will not bloom.

Temperature: Cattleyas generally enjoy warm temperatures; ideally, 55-60F at night and 70-85F during the day. Mature plants do well with a 15-20 degree difference in day and night temperatures. Keep in mind that temperatures close to the window on a windowsill will be colder or hotter than your general house temperature.

Fertilizer: Any balanced orchid fertilizer (look at the numbers on the container, 20-20-20, etc.) can be used to fertilize your orchid. Feed weakly (¼ strength) weekly works well for catts. Once a month use clear water to flush any accumulated salts from the potting mix. Increase the fertilizer to ½ strength when the plants are in active growth.

Tips: Use a shallow tray of pebbles filled with water to increase humidity around your plants. Be sure the pot does not sit in water as this will rot the roots. Give your plants room for air to circulate around them. Crowding of plants can lead to problems with insect infestations and fungus

When the blooms are finished, remove them from the plant. Continue watering and fertilizing and within a year it will begin the blooming cycle again! Cattleyas should generally be repotted every two to three years either after flowering or in the spring.

Orchids Questions – Answers – Helpful Hints

Thank you for your e-mails with your questions. I welcome your e-mail with questions. Do you have a hint or experience you would like to share with the members? Is there something you would like added or change to the monthly newsletter? Here are the AOS suggestions to care for your orchids in November and December

Cymbidium: There are three important things to do: stake inflorescences ramrod straight for best presentation, watch for slugs and snails (especially just after a rain), and fertilize with a mild balanced formula regularly.

Oncidium crispum Complex: This is the season for plants in *Oncidium* section crispum from Brazil to shine. Extremely vigorous hybrids come in wide varieties of markings dominated with chestnut and brown and butter yellow. Give plants high light to produce strong upright inflorescences. The pseudobulbs should be plump, so do not let the plants dry out while they are in bloom. Later, plants will enter a dormant period.

Paphiopedilum: The flowering season for the "toads" or "bulldog" paphs is just getting underway. These cannot be grown everywhere, but where cooler summer nights allow their growth, there is no longer-lasting or more exotic display than these. Paphiopedilums are, in general, not heavy feeders, and it is especially important with this type to reduce nitrogen levels now for best flowering and spike length. Be watchful for water accumulating in the growth around the sheath, or for the late-season warm spell, either of which can lead to the sheath's rotting. As the spikes emerge, do not change the orientation of the plant toward the light, as this can lead to a crooked or twisted spike. While paphiopedilums rarely like to dry out entirely, water needs are significantly reduced beginning now. Overwatering at this time of year can quickly lead to root rot. Now is the time to practice good sanitary practices in your greenhouse or growing areas, as pest and disease problems have a way of multiplying rapidly in the darker and more crowded conditions that generally mark the winter growing area.

Phalaenopsis: Shortening days and cooler nights are the signals for inflorescence initiation in phalaenopsis. Nights in the greenhouse will now be in the low to mid 60s, depending on the thermostat setting. A reduction in nitrogen levels will go a long way to giving the best possible spiking, as will a boost in potassium and phosphorus. In other words, a "bloom booster"-type fertilizer is definitely indicated in the next few months. Disease and pest problems are best dealt with now, especially as mealybugs hide in the bracts and flower buds. Once they have established themselves, they are difficult to eradicate, and flower damage or crippling results. Potential disease problems can be dealt with by the application of a copper-based compound to control/alleviate rot problems before they start.

Vandaceous Genera: Whereas the general decline in temperatures is beneficial to cool-growing orchids, it is not for vandaceous plants. The only cold-hardy member is Neofinetia falcata. Orient your plants in such a way as to take advantage of as much light as possible. Reduce watering and feeding schedules.
