Orchids Questions - Answers - Helpful Hints


The following are answers to your recent questions. Please continue to send your questions, helpful hints or articles which will be featured in our newsletters, our website, or upcoming programs covering your topics. "Water and My Orchids":

Here are some general rules for watering your orchids:

The potting material should never be soggy. Generally you water once a week but there are several factors you need to consider and adjustments made for your individual conditions and plants. Small pots (5" or less) need more frequent watering than large pots (6" or more). Different potting materials and different size potting materials will dry at different rates. Clay pots will evaporate more water than plastic pots and, dry faster than plastic pots. Conditions are different from room to room. If you move your plants, observe them to see if your watering needs adjustment. Plants in decorative containers (china pot or decorative basket) will most likely slow down the evaporation of water and plants will stay wet longer. Temperatures, light air conditioning and heating will affect how fast the potting material dries out. Be ready to adjust your watering habits as the season changes, especially from spring to summer and from fall to winter.

No matter how careful you are when watering, some water may and will get in between leaves or new growth. If water stays there overnight, when temperatures become cooler, it may promote the growth of bacteria and fungi that may kill your orchids or the new growth of your orchids. Wipe any water that splashed on the leaves or in between the leaves. AOS recently held a free webinar, Pests and Diseases part 2 - Orchid Diseases, which discussed the correlation between improper watering and the growth of bacteria and fungi. The very informative



Watering early in the day is recommended. Greenhouses growers seem to suggest you stop watering at 2 PM in the summer, at 12 noon in the winter and at 1 PM in the spring and fall.

Many growers recommend you water your plants with room temperature or lukewarm water as a difference of 10 degrees or more between the temperature of the water and the room temperature may cause injuries to the plants. **No Ice cubes!**

Water from the top till the water runs freely through the drainage holes or immerse the plant in water up to 1/2" or so below the rim and let it absorb water for 10 minutes or so.

Be careful with water that is softened. There are 2 basic products for softening water: salt and potassium chloride. Salt adds sodium to the water and, over the long term, this can be deadly to your plants. Potassium chloride will not harm the plants.

Most orchid sources recommend a PH between 5.5 and 6.5 for orchids after adding nutrients and / or other additives.

"Humidity and My Orchids"

Most orchids require 60 % to 80 % humidity. These humidity levels are necessary for the plants. In the summer the natural humidity is usually sufficient to meet the needs of your plants, except on bright, sunny, dry days. Air conditioning in the summer and artificial heat in the winter may dry the air well below the need of your orchids and may cause your orchids to lose their buds and even their leaves in just a few days. If your humidity levels are consistently low, consider buying a humidifier. A cool mist humidifier will help considerably in maintaining the health of your plants. However, if you use one make sure the mist does not blow directly on your plants as this will eventually wet them and promote bacteria and fungus growth that may well kill your plants.

Another way of increasing humidity is by setting your plants on trays filled with pebbles or gravel and with water, as long as the plants are not in contact with the water. For this to be effective the trays must be wide enough so that the leaves of your plants are over the tray (from where the humidity will raise). Different sources believe a tray for a single plant will not be of much help as the little humidity rising from it will disperse very fast. They recommend you have a dozen or more plants grouped together as they will create a micro climate with higher levels of humidity.

"Bud Drop"

There are several things which can cause bud drop. Here is a list of reasons from the American Orchid Society why buds fall off before flowering:

- 1. Under or over watering.
- 2. Temperature extremes and rapid temperature changes (heating vents, air conditioning blowing directly on the plant).
- 3. Fumes from natural gas leaks, paint, other chemicals.
- 4. Ethylene high producers are apple, avocado, peach, pear, plum, melons, figs, and tomatoes.
- 5. Low humidity.
- 6. Genetics.
- 7. Aphids, thrips and some mites.
- 8. Changing growing location. It is suggested that if you want to change a plant's location, wait until the flower opens first.

You will need to consider your individual environment to determine which of the above may be causing your problem.

When Growing Under Artificial Light: It is important with many orchid varieties to provide light only as long as day light, or about equal hours, in order to initiate flower buds at the proper season. Lights should not be used to extend day length, since this may prevent blooming. Light requirements vary depending on genera and variety.

Very light shade or High light (4,000-8,000 foot-candles) is needed for varieties like Vanda, Cymbidium, Brassavola, Laelia, and some Epidendrum.

Medium shade or Medium light (2,000-3,000 foot-candles) is needed for varieties like Cattleya, Dendrobium, most Epidendrum, Oncidium, Stanhopea, Lycaste and Cycnoches.

Heavy shade or Low light (900-1,500 foot-candles) is needed for plants like small Orchid Seedlings, Phalaenopsis, Paphiopedilum, Odontoglossum, Miltonia, and Brassia.

How to Grow Leptotes Bicolor: Flowers generally in winter and spring months, flowers will emerge from the pseudobulbs base. This plant will do well on slabs if you have high humidity conditions. Fragrant.

Temperature: Cool to Intermediate. 98F high to 45F.low High humidity

Light: This plant prefers medium to high light, (1500 to 2500 foot candles). When growing at windowsills, eastern or southern exposure is ideal. When growing under fluorescent lights, grow 8 to 16 inches from the tubes.

Water: Water as the mix approaches dryness but do not allow the mix to become completely dry between watering. When growing on slabs, mist daily or soak the slab in a bucket of water for a short period of time.

Feeding: Fertilize every time you water <u>if plants are planted in bark</u>. Be sure to flush the mix with clear water once per month to prevent fertilizer salt build up. For <u>plants in moss or mounted on slabs</u> feed every third or 4th watering as the moss holds a lot of nutrients. Fertilize every other watering in the summer and every third watering in the winter.





Spring Housekeeping for Your Orchids

Now is a good time to check your plants and identify which ones are not performing well for you and not happy with your conditions. If you have a plant that is growing but never bloomed you should check to see if you are providing the proper conditions, light, humidity, etc.

Make a checklist of plants you will need to repot so you will not miss any which should be done. Take an inventory of all the materials you will need to repot. Will you need more pots in the correct size, mounting media, fertilizer, and something to fight pests on your plants? It's much easier to re-pot and care for your orchids when you have everything you need.

Cymbidium: As new growth appears increase the nitrogen level in the fertilizer. Watch for aphids, slugs and snails.

Paphiopedilum: Increase light levels should provide emerging spikes with the strength they need to grow strong

and straight. Check the crowns of your plants for both buds and insects.

Reminder: Keep watching your plants for any unwelcomed visitors and show them the door as quickly as possible! Check the CAIOS website or previous newsletters on how to rid your plants of pests. You will also now find some AOS culture care sheets on our website.
